ART IN CHURCH

The church's own Annual Youth Arts Festival is on April 27th & 28th.

Saltaire Village Society, Saltaire Learning and friends are hoping to repeat the success of last year's World Heritage Weekend this month, on Saturday 21st and Sunday 22nd

Once again alpacas from Greenside Alpacas will be joining in the celebrations in Roberts Park on Saturday - along with stone carving, knitting and spinning demonstrations people will be helped to make their own model alpaca. Other events in the park include a visit by Marshal's Victorian Fun Fair and, in the North shelter, a drama written especially for the Hattie occasion by Townsend (See page 3). Shipley College's Salt Hall will host a display

of part of the Saltaire Archive and a preview taster of the 'Golden Threads' exhibition by the Young Ambassadors of Bradford Museums and Art Galleries.

Also to be seen will be large format art work from Blaeanavon Art and Artists' Association (Blaeanavon is a World Heritage Site)

Proceedings begin on Friday, 20th with a concert at Caroline Social Club, featuring steampunk band BB Black Dog with local support from Ovibus, and Steve Huison and Shaun Beggs. (Doors open 7:30, Admission £4 on the door).

Researching the World War 1 period to provide material for Hattie

Townsend's most recent dramatic production, "After the War was Over", I came across the following information:-

The Abram Peel Hospital in Bradford was a designated centre for the treatment of shell-shocked soldiers brought home from the Front. Abram Peel was Lord Mayor of Bradford in 1916, and the hospital later became the Leeds Road Isolation Hospital in Bradford Moor.

In 1916/17, the textile mills employed a largely female workforce, and many feared for their safety when going to and from work in the dark. As a result, a kind of female "police force" was used to provide extra protection. Its members became aware of the plight of the shell-shocked soldiers and they determined to do something to help. They formed themselves into the Khaki Club, meeting trains which brought the soldiers to Bradford, taking them to the hospital and befriending them. They even established a social centre for them in Forster Square to enable them to relax away from the hospital.

One of the founders of the Khaki Club was **Louisa Pesel**, a relatively well to do 46 year old woman, whose war efforts also included assisting Belgian refugees and raising money to provide ambulances for use at the Front. She was also an expert embroiderer, and used this as therapy for the soldiers. The men produced a beautiful altar front for use at the cathedral and at services at the hospital.

I struggled to find a reason to share this touching story of compassion with *Sentinet* readers, until colleagues **David King and Dave Shaw** were able to establish a Saltaire link, however tenuous: Louisa's mother attended the 1882 Saltaire Conversazione at Victoria Hall, and she was entered in the guest list as a governor of the Salts Schools. She was interested in education and had enrolled her five daughters (including Louisa) in Bradford Girls Grammar School at a time when it was disapproved of by the public for teaching girls maths and science subjects, and doing PE! The result was the strongly independent, empowered, activist with a social conscience, Louisa. She never married and died aged 77 years old in Winchester.

Hattie's drama does not include the Abram Peel Hospital or the Khaki Club because the details did not fit the plot, but no research is ever wasted and a story like this cries out to be shared.

The drama is being performed as part of the World Heritage weekend celebrations on April 21st & 22nd in Roberts Park, and is free. [*See p.3 opposite*]

With the idea of vigilance in his mind (as explained last month) James Duncan Neighbourhood asked Watch Officer, PC Gary **Smith** to contribute a regular column to the **Sentinel.** This was not to feature the reports of crimes. It will be performed outside the North Shelter in Roberts Park, behind the bandstand, at 2pm and 3.10pm on the afternoons of Saturday, April 21st and Sunday, 22nd.
