SVS will be discussing issues of parking and public transport at our meeting on January 8th. **Our meeting on Tuesday, February 19th, at Caroline Social Club**, will begin with a discussion of the Saltaire Management Plan. THE INVENTIVE AND COLOURFUL GEORGE WHITELEY

Peter Randall, barber at 205, Bingley Road, has been cutting the hair of Saltaire residents for almost 40 years, and has met many local characters. Talking with Peter is always entertaining, and he recently recalled a man whose interest in electricity definitely influenced his life style.

George Whiteley of Branksome Drive has the distinction of being the first man in Yorkshire to receive TV signals using an aerial at Dudley Hill. He built his own TV set using an old oscilloscope in 1936, and contacted Alexandra Palace in London to say that he'd received their test card, but they denied that it was possible for the signal to have reached Yorkshire. It was not until he described the card in detail, and the fact that it had recently been changed, that they believed his claim.

George's life revolved around his electrical inventions to make everyday tasks easier. His son, **Richard**, who still lives locally, added to Peter's account of his achievements:-

- ❖ His house was at the top of a steep slope and his garage was at the bottom. In order to carry 3 people up the slope, he constructed a cable railway, some 40 or 50 feet long.

- ❖ It was powered by mains electricity, but he also generated his own from an overshot water wheel with a 5 foot diameter, situated on a stream which ran behind his garage.

- ❖ This wheel also provided the electricity for lighting his house, stored in 8 lead/acid 12-volt batteries.

- ❖ Later, during World War II, he constructed an air raid shelter in his garden out of old tramlines and concrete blocks which went 21 feet into the ground – electricity provided home comforts.

- ❖ He adapted a New Imperial motorbike to run on electricity, and he was criticised by government departments for undermining the war effort by wasting energy, despite the fact that he had generated it himself.

He also experimented with:-

- ❖ "Commissionaire" electrical, automatic garage door opening system.

- ❖ Solar panels on his kitchen roof to heat water in his house.

- ❖ An electrically heated toilet seat.

- ❖ "Rotosign", a colourful, revolving advertising sign for businesses. George was featured by ITV on a programme called "Don't Just Sit There" hosted by Magnus Pike and Miriam Stoppard, but it was never shown because of a strike by ITV staff on the date when it was due to be transmitted.

Richard also reflects that his father had other interests too:-

- ❖ An early radio ham, transmitting from his garden shed.

- ❖ Announcer at Manchester Belle Vue and Odsal speedway tracks. Known as "The Golden Voice".

- ❖ Amateur dramatics with Shipley Congregational Players.

Sadly, George died in 1981 aged almost 78 years, but is remembered affectionately by both Richard and Peter as one of the most inventive and colourful characters in the district.

- ❖ **March 2003** Albert Bowtell presented us with our first 'scoop', when he brought us a piece of window discovered in the ruins of Milner Field; a great encouragement to the paper in its infancy.

- ❖ **Dec. 2004** Our next 'exclusive' came from Saltaire Cricket Club who wanted *us* to break the news of the club's plans to renovate the "dilapidated Half-Moon pavilion".

- ❖ **April 2005** Having featured the progress of the Roberts Park project for five months, it was a pleasure to report on its successful completion.

- ❖ **Sept. 2006** Our lead story concluded: "It is hoped that there will be sufficient interest to launch a *Saltaire History Club*." The rest, as they say, is history!

- ❖ **Dec. 2007** Only a "community" newspaper could dedicate the front page to one local hero; but Clive Woods, who had died the previous month, was both a regular contributor and a valued supporter from the start.

- ❖ **Jan. 2008** On a lighter note [*He* has to get a mention]: "Roger Clarke, [was] Our Man on the Telly"

- ❖ **April 2009** Unusually, the whole front page (complete with photo) was dedicated to one story: the 150th anniversary of the opening of Saltaire Congregational Church (now URC).

- ❖ **Feb. 2010** "Fish May Be First – Little Doubt About Trout" was an interesting item, - *sent by a reader* – but too 'absurd' to be the lead anywhere else.

- ❖ **April 2011** No.100 coincided with the first World Heritage Weekend and was a 'bumper' issue, produced with, and sponsored by, Saltaire Village Society.

- ❖ **August 2012** Under the second of three headlines about the proposed hydro-electric scheme, we gave equal space to two very different views – both from respected voices within the community.

In retail Saltaire, for every sad farewell there is a
welcome, Says Roger Clarke

Tracey Bennett and her Mum Andrea have
successfully run the Victoria Tearooms at 8, Victoria
Road for the past seven and a half years, but due to
personal circumstances have had to give it up.
Tracey says "I have had such a rewarding time
owning a business in Saltaire, and it has been a
privilege to get to know everyone, both customers
and people in the village." I know many people
who have enjoyed Tracey and Andrea's warm
welcome and excellent food, and will be so sad to
see them depart.

However, on November 27th, the Tearooms re-
opened with new owners. They are another mother
and daughter team of **Dora Karczewski and Nicky**
Tinsley, both of whom have previous links with this
area. Dora came to England in 1971 from Poland
and lived in the Shipley area until 1991 when her
family moved to Leeds. Nicky was born here and
returned to Shipley between 2001 and 2011. The
pair has not worked together previously and this will
be their first venture into catering. Dora was
previously a graphic designer and then worked for
the Yorkshire Post as Editorial Liaison. Nicky had a
career in banking. However, they are excited by
their new enterprise, and have lots of new ideas
which they will be trying out over the next few
months. They are conscious that most of their
customers will still expect a traditional English
afternoon tea in this World Heritage Site, and will
still be providing this, but it would be foolish of
them not to offer some alternatives for customers
who would appreciate something a little different.
Nicky's enthusiasm is for good quality coffee and
she has introduced this as an addition to the
Tearoom fare. Dora's strength is her baking and her
Polish recipes. She has already tried out her Polish
apple cake and Polish breakfasts, which have both
been well received.

Saltaire History Explorers Investigate

TRACES OF WORLD WAR II

With Jonathan's class studying 'The Home Front' at school, we went looking for surviving traces of the Second World War in Saltaire. A structure with viewing slits, where employees of Salts Mill took turns at fire-spotting, could still be seen on the roof of the north-west corner of the mill until recently, but has now been removed. As with many other UK towns, the cast iron railings outside Victoria Hall were scrapped and their absence provides a long-living reminder of war-time sacrifices. We now realise that much of this removal was more of a morale boosting exercise than genuine recycling to aid the war effort. More solid evidence includes a surviving, but blocked, rifle defence position built into a wall next to Glen Rd., presumably constructed by the Home Guard to protect Saltaire from the North. What most caught Jonathan's imagination were reports of air raid shelters at the top of Albert Rd which a few long term residents remember playing in as children. There is nothing to see above ground now but James Bonsall from Bradford University tested out new archaeological geophysical techniques ('geophys' to Time Team watchers!) here and on various open spaces of Saltaire. Sure enough, beneath the tarmac of Saltaire Primary School's all weather pitch the ghostly outlines of the shelters can be made out, awaiting the attention of future archaeologists.
