A council committee meeting to discuss the trees (and other works) on Victoria Road will be held on Wednesday October 8th at 5.30pm in Committee Room 1, City Hall.

This is in response to the petition that asked the council to look again at their initial decision to remove all the trees and not plant any replacements. The lead petitioner has delegated the role of spokesman to me and I will have five minutes to speak. I have asked the council to give

me the results of the test digs that were performed a couple of months ago but have not received them yet. The public can attend the meeting and given that hundreds of people signed the petition I am hoping that as many as possible will be able to go and support it.

CHASING THE SIXPENCE

Roger Clarke reviews Rachel Bellerby's new book

Salts Walks thrives on repeat bookings, and so it was with great pleasure that we recently rejoined Titus Salt School to talk with more of their students about the process of dyeing in Salts Mill. The content and direction of our presentation owes much to the questions asked by students and our interaction with them. So it was that we found ourselves focusing on the olfactory impacts of life in Victorian England and life today. With the scene already set by talking about how smelly life in Bradford was, and about the use of stale urine as a mordant to fix the colour in the cloth, **Maria Glot** remembered that the dyeing process using aniline dyes was just as smelly as that using natural dyes. Her source was a delightful book, which I thought that *Sentinel* readers might like to share with us. It is called "**Chasing the Sixpence**", subtitled "The Lives of Bradford Mill Folk", by **Rachel Bellerby** and published by Fort Publishing Ltd in 2005. The sixpence involved relates to the practice of workers changing jobs to seek better wages.

The book looks at life in Bradford textile mills between the 1920s and the 1970s as seen through the eyes of 61 respondents to Rachel's advertisement in the local press. Because it is in the everyday language of ordinary folk it makes for compelling reading, and Rachel has skilfully organised it into sections which consider both work and home life, as well as the changing fortunes of the textile industry over this period. It is down to earth, humorous and very easy to read. The short section on dyeing talks about the dense steam in which the dyers had to work, the practical jokes played by the workers on each other and on visitors, and the noxious chemical smells which marked out dyers from the rest of the workforce:

"You'd see them walking home and they'd always stand out by the smell. It was a real strong chemical smell. It must have stuck to their overalls. Their hands would be dark coloured with the different dyes and I bet they never got the dyes out of their nails. They tended to stick together, I suppose because it was quite specialised work and people were always complaining about the smell if they sat near to them on breaks. I mean, what were the poor chaps supposed to do?"

The book is not only about Saltaire, but the experience of mill life was similar throughout Bradford and district, and Salts Mill was not significantly different from anywhere else. I guarantee that it will resonate with *Sentinel* readers who worked in the Mill, and appeal to those who want some real understanding of what life was like in this mid 50 years of the last century.

Stories from World War One

Mary Isabel Salt –

"Pacifist and Proud Of It"

Not everyone was in favour of the war, many were pacifists and a few were not afraid to air their views. A granddaughter of Titus Salt was as she declared publicly "A Pacifist and Proud of it."

Mary Isabel Salt, born on September 6th 1876, was the youngest of four children, and the only daughter of Titus Salt Junior and Catherine Crossley. Following her father's death in 1887 she lived with her widowed mother firstly at Milner Field, then at Denton Park in Ben Rhydding. Throughout the war years they were living in Harrogate.

Brought up as a Liberal, Isabel was a popular public speaker throughout the war years, sometimes speaking twice on the same day. She was a suffragette, and spoke on numerous occasions at Victoria Hall, Saltaire. Isabel became disillusioned with the Liberals and she joined the emerging Labour Party. In one speech she is quoted as saying: "The great hope for the future lay with the Labour Party."

In the run up to the 1918 General Election she spoke at election meetings in support of Tom Snowden, the Labour Party candidate for Shipley.

Isabel never married and she died on May 21st, 1968 in Chichester, aged ninety-one.

A First World War Concert Party, billed as "Performed by talented local people", will make two appearances in the village before hurrying over the hill to provide the grand finale to the Ilkley Literature Festival Fringe.

The show has been devised and will be directed by Saltaire's own singer-songwriter, poet and impresario **Eddie Lawler**, who tells us that as well as famous verses from the time, "The performance will feature songs to join in, most of which are well-known, but the audience will be treated to some re-discovered gems from the early 20th century, including *Meet Me Gwen On Shipley Glen*, which will be sung for the first time in over 100 years" [although attentive *Sentinel* readers will recall it from our April 2014 issue.]

Now that it's all over –
'To wrap fact in a story is to give it power'

Says **Hattie Townsend**

For five performances during the Saltaire Festival, large audiences (sometimes almost alarmingly large!) moved round the streets and gardens of the village and followed the narrative, sometimes heart-breaking, sometimes outrageous, of the nine characters presented whose lives had been darkened and changed forever by the Great War.

As the writer/director, the performances of the actors, professional or experienced amateur, aged from nine years old to richly mature, filled the roles with a truth and energy beyond my expectation, and to them I owe a debt of gratitude.

In conversation after the performances, two families shared their stories of the trauma of 'post traumatic stress' moved by the plight of the shell-shocked soldier, rejected by his community, played with such sensitivity by Ian Barwick. It is therefore fitting that a donation from the very modest profits from the play will be sent to 'Combat Stress' the veterans' mental health charity, who help present day sufferers from this affliction.

To the Saltaire Festival and everybody who supported the production, Maria Glot of Saltaire Village Experience and I extend our warmest thanks and hope that you will see the promised film by next year.
